

Footpaths - an overview...

The Editor is right in her Editorial last quarter to highlight the health benefits and joy to be found walking in the beautiful countryside which surrounds Hurst Green. Its name originates from the Saxon word 'hurst' meaning 'rising ground topped by woodland'. When out walking you can imagine the generations that have gone before, seeking a way through dense woodland to their destination. There are many footpaths in Hurst Green which can be seen on the maps of Ancient Woodland and Public Green Spaces at hurstgreen-pc. org.uk/neighbourhoodplan.

Public footpath facts

- 1. Footpaths were created by people walking across the land to work, market, the next village, church and school.
- 2. Public footpaths are open only to walkers.
- 3. Public bridleways are open to walkers, horse riders, non-motorised vehicles such as bicycles and horse drawn carriages.
- 4. Today a public footpath is legally part of the Queen's Highway and subject to the same protection in law as all the highways, including trunk roads.
- 5. It is the Highway Authority's statutory duty to record, manage, maintain, protect and change public rights of way (but they don't unless pushed)

Public Footpath

Parish Councils are given certain powers

- 1. Maintain any footpaths which are maintainable.
- 2. Create new footpaths in agreement with the land owner.
- 3. Signpost and way mark public paths.
- 4. Erect lighting on a footpath where appropriate, e.g. where a footpath leads to a bus stop.

Walkers' rights

1. It is a legal right to 'pass and repass

along the way'. You may stop to rest or admire the view, providing you stay on the path and do not cause an obstruction.

- 2. You may take a pram or pushchair.
- 3. You can take a manual wheelchair or mobility scooter if the surface is suitable.
- 4. You can take a dog with you, provided it is under control.

Walkers' responsibilities

- 1. Do not disturb or harm any wildlife, particularly ground nesting birds.
- 2. Take care not to disturb or dig up wild flowers.
- 3. Do not drop litter.
- 4. Keep dogs under control on the footpath.
- 5. Clear up your dog's poop out of respect for other walkers.

Landowners' responsibilities

- 1. Paths must be way marked to make the route clear.
- 2. Keep the path clear of vegetation.
- 3. Avoid obstructing the path.
- 4. Do not cultivate (e.g. plough) footpaths or bridleways that follow a field edge.
- 5. If a cross field path is ploughed it has to be reinstated.
- 6. Gates and stiles must be kept safe.
- 7. Bulls over 10 months old are banned by law.

Helpful information

Free online Ordnance Survey maps showing public footpaths, bridleways, and other rights of way are available online at footpaths.com and at outdoor shops. The map of the High Weald, Ordnance Survey Explorer 136, covers Hurst Green.



Under the gazebo...

What a great space we now have at the Community Shop. With funding amounting to £4000 donated by Tesco thanks to the support of local people like you, there is now a beautiful wooden gazebo situated outside the shop. It has already been used as a pop up shop by Renew, Usborne Books, Flamingo Cards and is available for all sorts of events.

The rest of the money has been spent on other garden improvements e.g. plants, although some of them were eaten by some visiting deer. Another of our outside projects, known as 'Dingley Dell', is our Wildlife Garden.



The Wildlife Garden is situated behind the Wendy House and is currently in the development stage which has taken hours of exhausting work clearing out all the stinging plants and litter. Dingley Dell is meant mainly for the village children but, of course, anyone can join in setting it up and running it. Soon we will contact the school and other organisations to see whether they would like to be involved by designing/making animal habitats e.g. hedgehog houses etc.

We have a lovely bird bath which was made by Bob Janes and we have already taken some short videos of the various animals using it! As soon as we are able we will display the best of these videos on the screen in the café.

A Tribute to Lilian Cruse



As reported in the last issue, Lilian Grace Cruse passed away just before the magazine was released after a long battle with illness.

Though some will not recognise the name, many in the village will know her from various roles from the early days of the Brownies as a helper, the stool ball team, as part of the twinning or village hall committees, short mat bowls. Children in Need and Comedy Capers or many other groups she was involved in over the 50+ years the family have lived in the village. Lilian was originally raised in Chichester where she was an active member of the Salvation Army, and was also where she met her husband, Robin, the reason she fought as hard as she did over the last months of her life to try to get to their 60th wedding anniversary in September. It is unfortunate that she did not quite make it as it did not take much excuse for her to throw a party.

They moved to the village to allow them to raise their children in the countryside, to teach them the importance of appreciating their surroundings and to learn respect for people and their environment.

Many in the village will at one time or another have been to one of the parties or Bar-B-Ques that were often thrown by Lilian, and many times the house was over full of friends, relations of friends of friends, to a stage where tents were set up in the garden, or Lilian and Robin slept in the kitchen to ensure everyone had a bed for the night.

But Lilian was not just a housewife – during the hard times there was not the luxury of doing this, she worked around the area taking any job that she could find, from cleaning jobs to working at the cricket bat factory, but her biggest success came by chance when Little Chef opened their first café on the edge of the village.


Through some luck but mainly dogged determination and hard work, she persuaded them to let her manage the café when it opened, and though it took a lot of her time, Lilian turned it into one of their most successful restaurants in the area, So much so they asked her to go to other Little Chefs to train up the staff there.

But in the end it was family she cared for most, and when the trips started to affect them, she left the company and put her effort and hard work in to the village life and organisations. By this time life



in the village was changing, shops were disappearing such as the bakers, Blinks the butcher, the bike shop and grocers, and the village was growing with the development of Coronation Gardens, Great Oaks, etc.

As the younger generation grew Lilian and others understood that village life had little to offer them and tried to help them by talking to them. Many who are now parents still remember her as the Grandma that picked up her grandchildren, or the lady that made the 'cheese straws', and still talk about her fondly and say how much she is missed. But Christmas fast approaches, and she always loved this time of year, a time for friends and family to forget their 'troubles and strife' and to come together in joy and happiness. She would always go back to remember we were celebrating the birth of Christianity, but more important was to love, remember and be there for each other. It will be a hard time for her family this year, especially her husband, she is greatly missed, but we will raise a class of 'port and lemon' or a 'Snowball' to her and Fred Goatcher, and wish them both, and everybody else a very merry Christmas and a happy new year. Apart from playing friendly matches each week, club members love a challenge and in January take part in a club competition with matches for ladies and men's singles plus doubles. Each Christmas members play in a competition to win a Hamper and a Social eve is held with plenty of food and drink. Occasionally there are friendly matches against other local clubs such as Marden,
