

The church is open on Wednesday mornings from 10am-12 or Sundays 9-11am. There are also donation boxes in Sainsburys St Leonard's, Morrisons Hastings and Jempson's funeral directors in Battle. Village Hall Update

It is over twenty years since the extension was built at the hall. Time flies.

We are halfway through a four-year program to repair, replace and decorate.

We have already had the windows replaced in the large hall, which has resulted in a reduction in our annual gas bill. The old windows were the original ones from when the hall was built in 1928, so of course were single glazed.

The exterior has been painted and most of the interior – small hall, foyer, kitchen and toilets. It just leaves the large hall to be decorated but before we do, we are looking at insulating the ceiling as there isn't any and the heat goes straight up and out!

We are also looking at having a heat saving system installed that will save on the gas bill. (We did have two new gas boilers fitted in 2012.)

I'm sure that most of you will have noticed HURST GREEN VILLAGE HALL on the gable end of the hall – no excuse for not knowing where we are!

We have had sensor lights fitted outside all exterior doors. We also need to replace some of the chairs, they are looking tired and a lot are split.

We are applying for grants and will be doing fund raising events during the year, which we hope will be well supported. The first of these is a Quiz Night on Saturday 25th April at 7.30pm.

This year we will not be having a Village Fete in June, but it will be back next year.

There will be a V.E. Day celebration on 9th May. More details on page 7 of this issue of *the Hurst*.

Don't forget that the Village Hall is for the use of everyone. If you have a celebration or special event coming up give me a ring – 07541 800537.




## **Ellerhoop visit 2020**


It would be great to see lots of people from the village come along and make our

## **Letter** from the **Vicar**

As usual the days are flying by and by the end of February Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday will be upon us and the Church will enter the season of Lent, a time when many people, even those who aren't Christians, decide to give something up.

This has started me thinking about the difference between discipline and habit.

Obviously there are good habits and bad habits but I guess that discipline infers that more effort is needed. One dictionary definition says that discipline is a controlled behaviour; self control, while habit is an action done on a regular basis. So one might need discipline to break out of or change a habit.

An article in *Psychology Today* by Iliana Simons Ph.d says, "We typically define discipline as the ability to give up immediate pleasures for long-term goals". It is so important to develop this ability and especially to install it in children. Delayed gratification is constantly challenged in a world where we all expect everything to happen instantly.

As Christians we talk about Spiritual Disciplines, and there are a long list of them – most of them can however be gathered under 5 headings. You won't be surprised to hear that Prayer is a vital spiritual discipline. Prayer is about making time to have a conversation with God, both to talk and to listen. It is easy to get in to the habit of praying without it being a discipline. Sometimes we reel off a quick list of requests as if God is some kind of holy vending machine, where we put in our prayer and hope that He will dispense the answer that we want.

The second spiritual discipline is Fasting, this is all about delayed gratification. Sadly many Christians only ever practice this discipline during Lent and then they give something up, fast from something, without understanding that the whole point of fasting is to do something positive. To go without a meal in order to spend more time praying and focusing



on God. To go without a pleasure or treats such as alcohol or sweets for a period of time in order to give the money you save to the poor and again to be able to focus more on God.

Spiritual discipline number three is reading the Bible, and for Christians this is one of the main ways that God will reveal Himself and His will to us. Christian or not it has spoken to every generation, culture and age and has much wisdom to offer. Next comes Worship, much more than simply turning up at church, worship is about acknowledging who God is and placing Him above and before everything else. Finally comes Serving others – putting others first, forgiving them, treating them as you would like to be treated, going out of your way to help them whether it is convenient or not, this really can take discipline, self-control and an effort of will!

## **Neighbourhood Plan**

### Early concept for six new family homes on Burgh Hill

**Rother District Council have allocated** mandatory provision for 75 new homes for Hurst Green village. To respond to this, as many residents will already be aware, the Parish Council are actively in the process of creating a Neighbourhood Plan.

'Hurst Green to 2030' is the community initiative to produce the plan, which it is hoped will have a genuine influence on the development of and the positive transformation of our community, including Silver Hill and Swiftsden.

Following the professional site assessment in 2019 of possible housing sites, landowners were invited to put forward their concepts for consideration by the public. The first of these to be received is a concept proposal for six new homes from the landowners of the HG 11 site on Burgh Hill.

The site on Burgh Hill is currently grass pasture land, and was originally identified as a possibility for new housing in 2003 by the District Council. Today it is boundaried by mature planting and by an area of wetland forming the southern boundary between the site and open farmland beyond. The northern boundary (to the road) is currently screened by a 2 metre hedge.

Considered by some to form a natural infill between the existing residential developments to the north, west and east of the site along Burgh Hill, the landowner is proposing that each of the 6 possible new 4-6 bedroom dwellings could feature a site area of approximately a quarter of a hectare. They are also proposing providing

a new pedestrian public footpath along the front of the development.

Residents are invited to view these initial proposal materials on the hurstgreen2030. uk website or by contacting the Parish Clerk on 01580 860111. Anyone with comments to pass on to the landowner is warmly invited to contact a member of the neighbourhood plan Steering Group or any Hurst Green Parish Councillor.

Residents should note that while this site was identified as part of the Neighbourhood Plan call for sites process, the receipt of this concept proposal does not necessarily mean the site will be allocated for housing development.

## **Our Trip To India**

I am prompted by Annabelle's editorial in the Winter 2019 *Hurst*, wherein she quotes a couple of sayings by Mother Teresa. These were, "I alone cannot change the world, but I can cast a stone across the water to create many ripples!" and "Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We only have today. Let us begin!"

Alysoun and I recently went on a journey to India and visited the Kisan Gat Memorial Park in New Delhi, dedicated to Mahatma Gandhi, Gandhi was a Hindu and a special man. The term 'Mahatma' means Great Soul, reserved for the holiest of men in Hinduism. He was a gentle but determined man who became a lawyer after training at the University College of London. He gradually became a social activist.

Around his monument are tablets with some of his dictums. For example, "My life is my message" and "Do not listen to rumours, but if you do, do not believe them".

He sought peaceful independence from Britain and in August 1947 achieved this goal - "In a gentle way – you can shake the world!" and "Be the change you want to see!"

Sadly, he wanted a United India but had to agree to partition to form Pakistan - "The soul dries up without the company of the good" and "Selfishness keeps us worrying forever!"

On January 30th 1948 he was assassinated by a fellow Hindu who disagreed with him, which is strange, as Hinduism is a non-violent religion – "An eye for an eye will only make the rest of the world blind".

## **Gardening Tips** for the Spring

#### **MARCH**

- If not already done, prune all hybrid tea roses. Remember the 3 D's, remove Dead, Diseased and Damaged. Prune to outer facing buds much as possible.
- Prune out inner facing wood (think of the bush as the shape of a goblet), keeping the heart open. This allows airflow through the bushes, which helps prevent a build-up of fungal problems.
- Multi-floras; prune following the 3 D's but prune less hard.
- Greenhouse: cleanse if not already done. Thoroughly wash the glass inside and out. Wash down benches, pots and seed trays for the new seasons planting.

#### **APRIL**

 Dig over all vacant ground incorporating as much organic material as possible.

This will help retain moisture in the soil. For vegetable growers, this is a good month for sowing many different vegetable seeds.

#### MAY

This is the month we think about planting out most of the bedding plants. If it is still frosty, wait until the end of the month or the first week in June for less hardy plants.

#### **Cricket Update**

The days are starting to draw out, the daffodils blooming and thoughts turn to cricket after our winter hibernation.



Unfortunately the ground is not in a great state at the moment – the autumn rains came early and continued through November to January so we've been unable to prepare the pitch as we normally would. We're hopeful for a spell of dry weather (perhaps even some sun) to allow the worst of the water to drain away. Towards the end of May we should be in good shape and ready to run a few introductory training sessions for anyone in the village or surrounding area who might like to have a go at playing the game.
