The Red Hand of Ulster

Where does that fit into the local history of Hurst Green?

In the seventeenth century Sir Peckham Micklethwaite lived in Iridge Place, London Road, Hurst Green. The Micklethwaite family was originally from Yorkshire and also had land in Longford, in the province of Leinster in Ireland.

Sir John Micklethwaite, a descendant of Sir Peckham, was baptised in Iridge Place in 1824. Sir Thomas used the Red Hand of Ulster as part of his family heraldry symbols.

The Red Hand of Ulster is rooted in Irish Gaelic history. Legend has it that the first man to lay his hand on the province of Ulster would lay claim to it. A band of warriors, who disputed ownership of the land, surged towards it. One enterprising warrior cut off his hand and threw it over the heads of the warriors and it landed in Ulster thus winning the land.

Another version from mediaeval Irish literature is that several real and legendary kings were given the name 'Red Hand' or 'Red Handed' to signify that they were great warriors.

Sir John's wife Jane, died on 12th August 1819. Sir John died on 20th April 1824. They are both buried in the chancel vault in the church of St Mary the Virgin, Salehurst. Marble memorials to them are in the south vestry in the church. For those interested in local history they are worth a visit. As are the hatchments (heraldic painting memorials) which are displayed in the church. A hatchment bears the coat of arms, crest and motto of a dead person. It was carried in front of the funeral procession to the church and afterwards hung on the gate of the deceased person's house. After several months it was transferred to the church and hung on the wall for all to see.

> Images of the Red Hand of Ulster can be spotted on gate posts still on land which was part of the Iridge Estate when it stretched from Coopers Corner to the church at Salehurst. Something to look out for when walking.

Anthea's Funky Cakes

TREACLE GINGER Chocolate cake

(Deep roasted flavour, bolstered by black treacle and warmly spiced with ginger)

125g unsalted butter, 3tbsp black treacle, 200g light brown soft sugar, 2 large eggs, 180ml warm water, 1tsp vanilla extract, 40g cocoa powder, 150g plain flour, ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda, pinch of salt, 1tsp ground ginger, ½ tsp cinnamon

For the frosting

50g unsalted butter, soft, ½ tsp ground ginger, 125g icing sugar, 1 tbsp milk, 25g crystallised ginger, finely chopped

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/gas mark 4. Grease and line the base of a 20cm round cake tin (preferably loosebottomed, as this cake batter risks fizzling out if left to stand).
- 2. Melt the butter with the treacle over a low heat. Stir in the sugar, eggs, water, and vanilla extract and set aside. Sift the cocoa powder and flour together into a large bowl then add the bicarbonate of soda, salt, and spices. Pour in half the liquid mixture and whisk lightly to form a very thick batter. Slowly add the remaining liquid, mixing until homogenous.
- 3. Pour the batter into the prepared cake tin and bake for 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean.
- 4. While the cake cools (10 minutes in its tin and then on a wire rack), you can prepare the frosting. Beat the butter until smooth then add the ground ginger. Stir in the icing sugar a little at a time, adding the milk to slacken the mixture. Add the crystallised ginger at this point or, if you prefer, you can sprinkle it on top

afterwards. Spread the icing thickly over the top of the cooled cake.

Kept in a tin in a cool spot, this cake will last for some days, that is if it survives past the first teatime!

BLUEBERRY YOGHURT Loaf Cake

75ml almond oil, 125g full-fat natural yoghurt, 150g caster sugar, 2 large eggs, 1 tsp vanilla extract, zest of 2 lemons, 210g plain flour, 1½ tsp baking powder, pinch of salt, 150-200g blueberries

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/gas mark 4. Grease and line a 900g loaf tin about 20cm long.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together the oil, yoghurt, sugar, eggs, vanilla extract and lemon zest. In a separate bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder and salt. Pour the dry ingredients into the yoghurt mix along with the blueberries and fold the lot very gently together, taking care not to mix any more than is necessary: overzealous stirring at this stage could result in a tough cake later.
- 3. Pour the batter into the prepared loaf tin and bake for 50-55 minutes or until a small knife inserted into the middle comes out clean. Leave to cool on a wire rack before serving.

Letter from the Vicar

Like many people I was very sad to hear about the death of Desmond Tutu on Boxing day. He was a teacher, a theologian, an Archbishop, an antiapartheid activist, a Nobel Peace Prize winner and a truly amazing man of God. Of course, he was not universally liked, people who speak truth to power never are. But of all the tributes and obituaries I have read it seems that almost everyone "Do not who met him thought very worry, do not highly of him indeed. He will be feel troubled. do remembered for many things, not be perplexed. not least for his good humour God loves you and infectious laugh. He has as you are" given us many pearls of wisdom.

Gyles Brandreth's blog entitled, 'Desmond Tutu goes to Heaven' recalls his meeting with Desmond Tutu in 2001 when he had been sent to Cape Town to interview the Archbishop. It is certainly worth looking up and reading in its entirety, but I want to share the final paragraph as an encouragement to you:

The Archbishop has finished his homily, but somehow he can sense that I am not wholly satisfied. He smiles. He recognises a lapsed Anglican when he sees one. He leans towards me one last time and, in a voice barely above a whisper, says, "You are like so many, my friend. You have everything, but, inside, you feel there is something missing: deep down, somewhere, it's not quite okay. Do not worry, do not feel troubled, do not be perplexed. God loves you as you are with your doubts, with your intellectual reservations, with your inability to make the leap of faith. God says, 'I made you, actually, and I made you as you are because I love you. Don't try to titivate yourself. Just be you and know that I affirm you. You are precious. You matter enormously to me. You matter as



if you were the only human being and, you know something' - he pauses for a moment and smiles a wonderful smile – 'I create only masterpieces. I have no doubt at all about your worth. You don't have to do anything. Your worth for me is intrinsic. Please believe I love you. You are not going to find ultimate satisfaction in anything out there because I

made you like me'. As St Augustine says, 'Thou hast made us for thyself and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in thee.' 'I made you for a worshipping creature – and you have worshipped money and fame, I know it – but, ultimately, I am the only one worth worshipping. I won't let you go, my child. I won't give up on you - ever. I won't. I will sit here like the father of the prodigal son, waiting. Come back home, come back home to me, and our celebration will be mindboggling.'"

A final explosion of laughter and the Archbishop pushes back his chair and says, "Come, we will go outside and watch the sun falling on Table Mountain and smell the flowers together. God is good, man, and he is waiting for you."

Walk etiquette BY DON NICHOLLS

Late January 2022 and our nearest wood is at its least attractive. A few remaining leaves flutter down from bare branches. The sun is glimpsed low on the horizon and underfoot boots slip on sodden muddy pathways. Progress is slow so walks are shorter.

Yet there'll always be dog walkers on the path doing their twice daily canine constitutional. No problem – we like dogs. However, mostly being off lead, their charges so to speak make a beeline for you. The cry of "He won't hurt you – he's only being friendly" echoes scarily as mud splattered paws bound towards you. And, sure enough, the pooch will slither to a stop within an inch of your leg panting furiously, while you – now sure that a chunk of your leg hasn't disappeared – can allow your breath rate to return to normal.

"Sorry!" usually accompanies this as dog and owner trudge on along the squelchy trail. "He won't hurt you" and "Sorry" are not that common on our walks but these exchanges are natural in their one-sided responses.

Usually, your fellow walker will appear some distance away, slipping and sliding on the track. A stranger? Well, a greeting is necessary – saying nothing is not an option on a country path, it would be seen as a sign of rudeness, and what would happen the next time you crossed paths – 'a double blanking' – could lay down a future of antagonism or misunderstanding. Unlike in towns and cities the friendly exchange is the oil that lubricates the future communication between two strangers diametrically opposed in their walks. On roads it need, by necessity, only be brief.



"G'morning" or "G'afternoon" and you've passed. On a wet slippery uneven woodland path time allows for a slightly longer exchange. "Hello, it's a bit chilly, isn't it?" or "G'afternoon, it's a bit (ie very) muddy today" or, slightly more imaginatively, "Hi, at least the rain's held off this afternoon" coupled with a smile. You have done your social duty and any future walk interchange should be easier with your prevous bland exchange to be built on. These greetings are not intended to lead to further social intercourse at the moment of exchange. Stopping and extending the triviality may lead to embarrassment or annoyance... if there is afternoon tea to be had or a 'soap' to be watched. However, the social interchange could be a bit weightier as you have some warning of the passing as you squelch and slip towards each other. "They should put duckboards on this path!" could be met by a "Yes, indeed" or "I don't know why the council haven't done it yet".

An intellectual step up could be the opener "Of course, with global warming it will only get wetter and slipperier." Here the response could be a simple "Yes" or a more comprehensive... "but if the Hudson Bay ice melts it'll be too cold for precipitation and the earth will remain icebound. At least it'll solve the mud problem", and there you might have a meeting of minds.

Our aforementioned dog walker should have left the exchange at "Sorry" but they pointlessly drew it out by adding "Cold, isn't it?" when it clearly was not and, as a regular dog walker, could have prepared a witty retort as we both slithered off.

Maybe more careful thought should be given to the initial wet winter walk exchange. If first impressions count, then woodland walk first impressions may count for even more as walkers slowly slide apart, perhaps measuring what was just said.

Of course, you can go for the maximum impression as a young dog walker challenged me with after my initial "Good Afternoon"... "They should reintroduce wolves to these woods."

A Brighton Fan through thick and thin!

I have always been a Brighton fan. I went to my first match on the 19th April 1965. We beat Darlington 3-1 to clinch the fourth division (now league 2) title. Bobby Smith of Spurs and England fame was playing for us. A crowd of more than 27,000 was in attendance!

Since then, there have been a few 'highs' and quite a few 'lows'! There was our one and only FA cup final appearance in 1983. We had spent 4 years in the top flight of English football, but that season relegation loomed. We needed a cup win to lift the spirits! Thanks to goals by Gordon Smith and Gary Stevens we were 2-2 with Man U with just a few minutes to go. Smith and Robinson were bearing down on Gary Bailey in the United goal. The commentator then uttered the now famous line, "...and Smith must score!" He didn't and we replayed a few days later. We were trashed 4-0! And relegated!

14 years later in May 1997 another memorable match in Brighton's history took place. This was at Edgar St. Hereford where the home side took on the Albion. Both teams had had a bad season in league 2 and depending on the result of this match, one of them would go out of the league. Brighton needed to win or draw as they had superior goal difference. Hereford needed to win but they had home advantage. At half time Hereford led by 1-0 thanks to an own goal by Brighton left back Kerry Mayo. At this point we faced oblivion! In the second half Robbie Reinelt scored what was perhaps the most important goal in the history of BHA football club! We drew 1-1 and were safe!

Now we come to the current season probably the best ever! Our two trips to Merseyside have yielded four points! It seems that whoever we play we have a chance of getting something from the game! I'm living the dream...!

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Gardening Tips for March to May

MARCH

The weather this month varies more than any other month of the year. Don't be tempted to plant out anything that hasn't been hardened off first in a cold frame, or if taken from the greenhouse.

• Finish planting border plants, lifted trees and shrubs, as soon as possible.

• Take off new base side shoots from existing border plants. Take only strong side shoots about 4" (100mm) and pot them up in good rooting compost. Then place in a cold frame or unheated greenhouse until rooting has taken place. A gentle tug after a few weeks will tell you if they have rooted well.

• Roses and many other shrubs can be pruned back this month.

APRIL

- Plant summer bulbs if not already done in late March, for example, Caen anemones, coloured St.
 Brigid's, Galtonians or summer hyacinths.
- Prune back spring flowering shrubs like forsythia.
- Plant up rhododendrons towards the end of the month.

 Sow seeds of perennials, such as oriental poppies (Papaver), lupins, in a pre-prepared seedbed outside.
 This is a great way to get

inexpensive plants.

Plant gladioli for a beautiful summer display.
Late April is a good time to plant evergreen shrubs, including conifers.

MAY


May can be a funny month as it can be very wet or very dry. In a drought situation, newly planted shrubs and plants will need regular watering to prevent them coming under stress.

• Spray roses with an eco-friendly product to prevent aphid and fungal problems.

• Stake plants in the herbaceous border, and sow annuals to fill in the gaps between plants. Give a dressing of fertiliser to these plants and watch out for any slug damage to the delphiniums etc.

• Do not cut back or tie old foliage on narcissi (daffodil) foliage, as doing this prevents goodness going back down to the bulbs for the next years flowering.
